



Giver Redemptive

Biblical

Romans 12:7 $\mu\epsilon\tau\alpha\delta(\delta\omega\mu\iota)$ metadídōmi; fut. metadốsō, from metá (3326), with, denoting association, and dídōmi (1325), to give. To share with someone, to impart, communicate, followed by the dat. (Luke 3:11; Eph. 4:28). Used in an absolute sense meaning one who distributes alms, an officer of the church (Rom. 12:8). With the acc. and the dat. (Rom. 1:11; 1 Thess. 2:8).

This gift involves a special ability – and desire -to share **material assistance**. The giving being discussed here is of personal resource – not the distribution out of the treasury of the Church.

You do NOT have to be wealthy to have this gift. However, it does seem that those with this motivational gift have often been blessed with abundant resource. It seems the more they give, the more they have! They also seem to have the corresponding abilities to accumulate, handle and distribute assets.

The word "simplicity" (or "liberality" in some translations) comes from the Greek word laplotetes.

This term sometimes means "liberality" in scripture. But here it means single- mindedness of heart, a purity of motive or purpose.

Since the giving involves personal resource, the giver should NEVER have a selfish motive. Sometimes the wealthy will make a donation expecting to gain influence or advantage for himself or herself. The ruling elders or senior pastor should never allow this (see James Chapter 2).

If such a motive is suspected, those in leadership should make clear to the giver that there will be no advantage allowed him. If the person giving the gift does not understand or agree, the gift should be refused. God will provide for your needs another way. For an example of how God feels about impure motives in giving, see Ananias and Sapphira in Acts 5:1-11.

Characteristics

The giver is the most difficult to peg by behavioral characteristics
Givers are legendary for diversity, adaptability, and flexibility
They do not fit easily into nice, neat pigeonholes
Has a generational worldview
Is focused on trying to prepare the way for his family and others after him
Is nurturing

Creates a family environment to foster relationships

Has a heart for sharing their faith, but tends not to do it personally

Wants to empower others to do the work of evangelism

Is very independent

Stands alone

Does not look to other people for help and sometimes not even to God

Resists being conned, manipulated, or guilt-tripped into action

Tendency to feel manipulated when others withhold information from him

Is able to relate to a wide range of people

Desires to empower other people's productivity

Desires to keep his own life private

Is not confrontational by nature

Is keen at finding unseen options, solutions, and resources

Is opportunistic in seizing an available moment

Finds favor in terms of money. Resources and money flow to him

Gives well and wisely, not impulsively

Tends to be frugal with family members which can cause friction

Tends to find bargains, good deals, or discounts before making purchases"

May tend to see money as a source of security

Lives in the present and future

Tends not to learn from the past

Does not like to be confronted on issues that are more than a week old

Likes to keep all options open as long as possible.

Hesitates to accept absolutes in circumstances, maybe even in the Bible

Is a natural networker

Has an ability to bring people together and persuade them to do things

Is pragmatic and practical

Is a peacemaker

Can work with people who have conflicting views and theologies

Can sustain ideological tension in a group or project

Provides a place of safety

Is involved in a diversity of projects, interests, and activities. Is multi-focused

Can birth, nurture, and protect new things and new ideas

New things arise and grow at a greater pace than other gifts

Can struggle with gratitude due to present focus and short memory.

Does spiritual things, but sometimes not from the right motivation

May avoid risk because of a tendency to rely on self rather than God's resources

Faith may seem hard for the giver

Most diverse/adaptable/flexible of all gifts

Designed not to be needy – does not look to others for help

Can look at a problem and find own solution

Can't be hustled – must accrue money before can give

Sensitive to manipulation of others toward spouse or family

Private in own life – protective of reputation of self, spouse, and family

Delegates spiritual warfare



Non-confrontational by nature — wait for opportunity to get best out of situation Immense heart for evangelism but does everything just short of sharing the gospel overtly Nurturer to family — facilitate family environment

Intuitive

Concerned about safety, cautious

Is without shame – does not have shameful view of self

Can be very impulsive

Insightful

Not a big risk-taker

Good listener

Money flows to them

They give well, invest wisely

Usually, the giver does not want to give funds for a start-up

They do not want to be asked for money

They also tend not to invest in the poor

Tendency for the giver not to learn from the past

Not easily conned

Does not like absolutes

Major Weaknesses

Independence

Does not need others

May not acknowledge needs to God

Hypocrisy. May appear to do the right things, but may not deeply pursue holiness

Control and manipulation

Desires to control based on fear of the unknown and risk. Tries to manipulate God and people

There is a tendency for the giver to see his money as a point of security

Biblical Example of Giver –

The life of Abraham provides us with some insights as to the functioning of this gift:

- 1. Givers may be entrusted by God with many assets (Genesis 13:1, 2).
- 2. Givers are of a generous and liberal spirit (Genesis 13:9, 10).
- 3. Givers can be very aggressive and resourceful in the protection of their assets (Genesis 14:14-16).
- 4. Givers recognize God's work and causes, and are responsive (Gen 14:18-20 Melchizedek and tithing).
- 5. Givers have a firm knowledge that God is the source of their wealth, and give Him the glory (Genesis 14:22-24).
- 6. God puts givers in the right place at the right time
